All Saints Academy Dunstable Report on Consultation to Change the Academy Day

All Saints Academy is pleased to advise on the consultation to change the Academy Day with effect from 01 September 2015. Thank you if you were able to respond.

Following the conclusion of the Consultation on 17 July 2015, the Academy wishes to record the results as follows:

41 items of feedback were received.

Of these, 22 (53.7%) were in favour, 16 (39.0%) were against, and 3 (7.3%) did not know.

Students may lose their focus after the extended period of time, and my child is especially prone to losing his attention. I am frowned that these changes are being made, and as a parent I regress. Thank you.

I don't think it will really make much of a difference & would be better to leave if how it is as students are settled in the hours they are doing.

This isn't what I agreed to when my child viewed the school I believe in students being able to get used to academy life and expectations but do not want my child fighting to find a seat to eat their snack at break struggling to access the eating provision which is already stretched and only offers limited amounts of choices. I do not want my child feeling anxious or intimidated during break and lunch. I don't wish my child to be able to witness or hear inappropriate behaviour or language during these times. I want them to feel safe and in an environment where they learn to grow as a person in an emotionally and physical development age appropriate manner. You plan for better teaching I support but not at a cost of any child's emotional wellbeing many 11/12 year olds are still going through puberty and the transition from lower/middle to academy is huge. Please more thought needed about break and lunch.

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This I feel is not a good change to the timetable. The main concern I have is lunch time, according to new time table years 7 and 8 go to lunch at 13:10 and leave at 13:50. The older years 9 through to 13 go to lunch at 13:30 and leave at 14:10. There is a 20 minute overlap where they have every year is in the cafe. Year 7 and 8 on their own already fill the cafe during their set lunch. The year 9s and 10s are both big years and also had the capacity to fill the cafe. There is also the last 3 years being added to this (as there is rumours of the common room being taken away and turning into a classroom) the cafe will be to full and not able to function properly, already students and staff cannot get a chair to sit down and eat and student are not allowed to walk the school during break and lunch times, if the weather is bad then no student wants to be outside so they will all be packed inside. With the higher demand on the staff in the cafe they will not be capable of serving the volume of people in the time allocated. I feel this will create a bad atmosphere for all people involved. This over crowdedness will impact both staff and students. I feel the current timetable although still crowed works. With the options of doubles of 1 hour and 20 minute blocks I feel these are more useful as teachers are able to set practise exams within lessons, than 65 minute blocks. Please do not change the timetable. Also with the common lunch time there will be a higher demand for the toilets and as students cannot get out of lessons to use these and because of the more students people will be unable to use the toilets as on maximum there is 16 toilets each for each genders, this means that 16 toilets will have to cater for 7 years of students. Furthermore their will need to be more teachers on duty to try and control the volume of students meaning less teachers around to help students that may need help with lessons during free time. With the greater mix of the older and younger years there is more chance of bullying making school a worse place for students.

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It will upset the students and affect their learning. The learning frame will also be too long to hold for the typical student's span of attention, double 40 minute periods are fine. They can acquaint for longer lessons, but also the ability to have a small break for the students between

I'm not in favour of this idea, due to the fact that we lose our morning tutor time, and we will have only twenty minutes to eat our lunch before other years come in. This means we will probably have to leave the lunch hall to give space for them, and neither me nor my friends particularly like going outside (especially in winter)!

If the timetable was to change there would be an ever increasing problem of space in common areas such as the Cafe. As a student I feel that if there are these changes to the timetables would cause greater disruption from the younger years and this would also cause me, the student, to being to not be able to remain in a single room for over an hour without a break or a chance to stretch my legs
