

## Dear Parents/Carers

After the recent atrocities in Manchester it has become clear that we need to do everything we can to further ensure the safety and well-being of our young people. To this end, I would like to thank all parents who have supported us in keeping our site safer by not bringing unnecessary traffic into the Academy, which means we can monitor visitors to the site and protect students and staff alike. After the half-term break we will also need to discuss our 'Lock-Down Procedure' with students. This will ensure we are capable of responding in the event of a critical incident at the Academy, which could be for any number of scenarios such as a dangerous animal or chemical leak in the building. I know, from when my own children went through the 'Lock- Down Procedure' in their schools, that it can lead to anxiety. Please be prepared to reassure your children that the chances of a critical incident occurring are minimal, just like a fire on site, but that it is important to have a procedure in place to keep us all safe.

The Academy is being used as a polling station **on Thursday 8<sup>th</sup> June** and I had originally planned to keep the Academy open. I now think it would be more prudent **to close to all students except for those sitting examinations**. There will be a skeleton staff on site including the Senior Leadership team. I apologise for the relatively short notice given for you to make alternative child-care arrangements, but trust you will understand the need to put the safety of our students first.

Finally, I am still hearing from staff of the occasional incidence of threatening behaviour from a few parents. This has occurred in face-to-face meetings, telephone calls and emails. Our vision of 'Living Well Together' must be borne out through every interaction we make, so that our children learn from positive role models. Unfortunately, I have had to take the measure of banning parents from site after threatening behaviour, and I will continue to take this stand to ensure the staff and students have a safe environment in which to work.

I hope you are having a peaceful and relaxing break and I look forward to the final summer half term when we will celebrate the marvellous achievements that our students have made throughout the year.

## Dear Parents/Carers

I am writing this piece having just watched the final instalment of 'Three Girls', the BBC's dramatised version about real-life grooming and sexual abuse of young girls in Rochdale. It was both harrowing and yet compulsive viewing, showing the failings of several agencies over safeguarding. I'm pleased that there is now far better co-ordination of inter-agency work but, more importantly, that young people are believed when they tell their difficult stories. At All Saints Academy, we take safeguarding very seriously because the safety of the children and young people in our care is of paramount importance. That issue of safety manifests itself in many forms. The NSPCC defines it as *'the action that is taken to promote the welfare of children and protect them from harm'*. When we interview staff at All Saints, for whatever position, they are always required to answer a question about safeguarding, in addition to us conducting all the background checks that are required. What you might be unaware of is that when Ofsted visit on inspection, the very first thing they check is that all safeguarding procedures are in place. If they are not then the judgement will immediately be Inadequate, regardless of whether the teaching and learning is outstanding or not. You will see in our latest report a small section on Safeguarding with the single line at the end *'The arrangements for safeguarding are effective'*. Therefore, as parents and carers, you can feel assured that your child will always be responded to in the most appropriate way should their safety be in question. What I would also say is that I believe we have one of the best Student Support teams that I have come across in any school, so when issues do arise, they are dealt with as quickly and efficiently as possible. If you have any concerns about your child's safety, in whatever form that takes, please do not hesitate to contact the Academy and we will listen to you.

### Work Scrutiny

We decided recently to use leadership meetings to develop a new version of our marking and feedback policy which centres on Identifying '*what went well*' and '*even better if*' and then putting this alongside a '*Now*' task to demonstrate improvement through a response to the feedback. Teaching staff and Student Support Workers '*walked the journey*' so they could see how their expectations can change. With their higher expectations we expect higher outcomes! Work Scrutiny is a very important source of inspection (and leadership) evidence for both teaching and achievement. At All Saints Academy, this is undertaken as part of lesson observations and 'book looks'. It is useful as it provides evidence for teaching over time and its impact on learning and progress over time. It has all the evidence we need to prove that we are a learning school with a big focus on individual and collective responsibility.

### **Work Experience**

Many of our students have confirmed placements for Work Experience and paperwork has been sent home as it arrives. Some placements will require an interview, some a specific uniform and there may be variations to the agreed days/hours of work. The outline of this information is included in initial paperwork. Now is also a good time to have a discussion with your child to plan travel, taking into account timings of the journey.

Where possible, students should make contact to arrange interviews for themselves, as this forms part of the work experience and understanding of the world of work. If any student is struggling with this I am, of course, here to offer support.

- Job Description (copy)

We have counted the points and are delighted that 400 out of 500 students are eligible to take part in our Thorpe Park visit on 30th June.

Letters have been sent home to invite students to participate and we have been able to subsidise the cost so that an experience that would normal cost £30 or more is available for £18.50. Support is available, as always, for students entitled to Pupil Premium funding.
