Target Setting

They have also set a target for attainment in one or two of their subjects and a personal goal. Form Tutors have really enjoyed the process of target setting with their students and it has been great to welcome so many parents and carers into the Academy for the meetings.

Year 10 JumpStart Programme

The JumpStart programme has been running in school since September. A group of students from Year 10 have met with the team from



Reactiv8 and have taken part in weekly group sessions that will help develop their employability skills. They have looked at the importance of resilience and having a positive growth mindset. They also had the opportunity to go on a trip to GoBowling, which they enjoyed and were praised for their excellent behaviour from Reactiv8 staff. The students have engaged well and feedback has been positive. This half term the students will receive 1:1 mentoring from the Reactiv8 staff, looking at identifying their own key employability skills and developing a personalised CV.

The Academy is pleased to announce that we have a stand-alone Inclusion Unit (The Bungalow) on the Academy site.



The Bungalow will support our SEND Students, across all year groups, who are struggling to engage with a full time education in the main Academy.

The curriculum the students follow changes weekly to meet their identified needs and to help us support them with any additional needs we identify whilst working with them. Working in small groups we are able to teach life skills, employability skills and enterprise so the students can use these skills Post 16.

Once strategies to support these students are embedded, they will be very gradually reintegrated back into mainstream lessons and a measure of their success will be their attendance and academic progress.

We welcome any visit or input from any parents/carers and would welcome any help should you have any skills to offer, especially catering, construction, CV writing, gardening or animal care. We are also doing work on the environment and recycling, so please ask us before you take a trip to the tip!!

It is our vision to become a centre of excellence within the area, supporting SEND students.

Improving Teaching and Learning through Marking and Feedback

We are ensuring that mistakes are being picked up in our students' work across all subjects: One strategy we have used to improve student literacy is to implement a marking and feedback policy. Our objectives are clear and simple:

- To improve engagement
- To improve quality
- To clarify expectations of marking and feedback
- To improve consistency

The idea is that class teachers across all subjects adopt the same marking style, which is quite straightforward. Our policy also gives students the time to properly respond to teacher feedback in what they're writing: Often in class we can rush students from one piece of writing to another and in doing so inadvertently embed poor literacy. When children start to take pride in their writing, they are willing to work on their errors. We tend to remember the things we take pride in as well. Redrafting and slowing down the writing process are key. The grid below outlines our strategy;.

Horse Care Elective



Safe Cycling

At the moment, we are focusing on cycling safety and cycling security. We are pleased that we have only had to send out three letters concerning unsafe cycling in the community and have seen a real improvement since we did so. Cycle security is also taken very seriously. We have a large covered cycle storage area and it is our expectation that all cycles will be locked during the day. We have a supply of strong locks which can be borrowed for the day if a student forgets their own lock and we can also sell these locks to students. Cycles are brought onto site at the student's own risk as clearly notified by our signs in the cycle area. Cycle theft must be reported by the student/family rather than the Academy and unlocked cycles may not be covered by your insurance.

Generous Hospitality

In line with our Academy vision "Living Well Together with Dignity, Faith and Hope" we have been focusing on being a hospitable Academy as set out in the Church of England "Vision for Schools: Deeply Christian, Serving the Common Good" document (Autumn 2016). We have provided a warm welcome with a light meal at all our parents/carers' evenings knowing that it can be a challenge to come straight from a busy day to an event here at the Academy. **Mr O'Rourke** and **Mrs Caldbeck** have been leading on this initiative and the feedback is very positive so far with some delicious suppers prepared by our catering company, Aspens, in partnership with our own student chefs.

Clergy Rotation

It has been a pleasure to work with Father Bernard, Rev Money and Father Diego over the past half term. If at any time, a student has a concern but cannot speak to either of the Safeguarding Leads, they should approach Mrs Pullen, Mrs West or Mrs Craig in the Student Services department and they will ensure that initial support is given until further help can be provided.

Lockers

Many of our students have been issued lockers and the recall and reissue of keys that took place over the summer has made the allocation of new lockers much easier. Lockers have also been grouped into year group blocks so that students will always have a locker with their peer group. Lockers are ideal for storing bags, coats and PE kit during the day to negate the need to carry them around the Academy all day. Students and parent/carers should be aware that Student Reception is unable to look after bags for students without a locker. If your child would like a locker, they can collect a 'Lease a Locker' form from Student Reception. A £5 deposit is required when requesting a locker and replacements for lost keys are charged at £5.

Lost Property

Lost property can build up quickly and we are unable to store it for long periods of time due to a lack of space. All lost property is available for students to view and claim at Student Reception. We will be donating all unclaimed lost property to charity on Friday 4th November. If your child has misplaced anything during this half term, please encourage them to visit Student Reception to look through the items that have been handed in.

Contact Information

As well as the systems we use at the Academy requiring contact information for parent/carers to be up to date, it is very important that we are able to contact you during the school day. This could be for any number of reasons, including medical, forgotten equipment or students wanting permission to stay at an after school club. If you need to update any information we hold, you can send in a note, write it in your child's planner, speak to Reception or use parentcontact@allsaintsacademydunstable.org.

Student Voice

It's already been a busy term for Student Voice; driving forward the harvest food appeal for the local Foodbank and then collaborating with Samaritans Purse to participate in Operation Christmas Child. Not only this but the team secured a visit from 'Dr Bike', part of the Sustrans movement in Dunstable, who came in to give our bikes a free safety check and repair. The most common fault was brake and gear cables that had rusted from being stored outside! An observation from the day was how many fantastic bikes are in the bike shed without a lock on! Please ensure that bikes are locked up when on the site. A huge thank you to Adam and Derek from Sustrans who spent the day on Thursday 19th October repairing the bikes of students who have signed up to our Safer Cycling Scheme.

Well under way is the Student Voice elections where every student and staff member will be asked to cast a vote to elect a Chair, Vice Chair and Secretary to the team to continue driving forward improvements at the Academy. It's fantastic to see so many students put forward for positions within the team; 5 for Chair and 4 for Secretary. I feel strongly that this is a positive reflection of our students confidence and passion to drive forward the Academy. Ballot papers will be given out on Friday 3rd November for votes to be cast.

Linking back to our operation Christmas Child, each tutor group has been assigned age ranges to purchase goodies for which will be put into Christmas shoe boxes to go to children in Third World countries who do not have the same luxuries as us.

Students also wanted to support those closer to home by collecting for 'Streetlife', a local charity who provide food and clothing to those homeless in the local area. Some tutor groups will be filling their boxes for Streetlife and others for Operation Christmas Child. All donations need to be in by Friday 17th

November to ensure they reach those in need before Christmas.
