Dear Parents and Carers

I hope you enjoyed the half-term break with your children and that they are well-rested for the hardest part of the year in the lead up to Christmas. It is very important that they attend school every day because if they are not here they cannot learn. We are having a real push on improving attendance this half-term so please encourage your child to come in if they only have a cold or feel like a 'duvet day'!

We have had a preliminary release of our progress 8 data which suggests we have moved up another category to become an 'average' school which is a category given to the middle 40% of schools in the UK. Last year we were below average, and the year before that wellbelow average. This is a tremendous improvement and the whole school community should be very proud of this achievement.

In the final week of last half-term, we had an Ofsted monitoring visit to ensure we are still moving rapidly in the right direction: becoming a GOOD school. I will share the news with you as soon as the official letter has been released.

This week our new school Chaplain Reverend Tim Davis starts with us one day a week and later this month a full-time counsellor will start. This is to ensure that even with exam results being our main focus., the personal development of our students is still of paramount importance.

The weather has suddenly got a lot colder! Please remind your children to wrap up warm and take care in the darker evenings! Kind Regards

Dear Parents and Carers

I was looking through my old school reports recently, not written on parchment – contrary to popular opinion – but pre-dating the birth of the vast majority of people reading this article. Some of the comments do not make for comfortable reading, and my handwriting has certainly deteriorated since it was first mentioned as an issue when I was aged 10. However, I was more interested in my absence record over a 13-year period. It seems that I missed three half-days whilst at Primary School and three days at Secondary School; that's about 99.8% attendance. I was very fortunate to enjoy good health, and also enjoy school.

The reason I raise this is because, whilst the majority of our students have good attendance records, there is a significant minority who demonstrate what is officially termed as 'persistent absence'. This is defined as a student missing 10% of more of their possible sessions. The importance of that is the link it has with attainment. Whilst we have now moved to a different system of grading, the message still remains the same, as highlighted in this Department for Education finding: **pupils with no absence are 2.2 times more likely to achieve 5+ GCSEs A*-C or equivalent and 2.8 times more likely to achieve 5+ GCSEs A*-C or pupils missing 15-20% of KS4 lessons.**

We know that achieving well at GCSE is a springboard for both higher education and employment opportunities, and that persistent absence can have a significant impact on progress. Governors, working with senior leaders and staff, are making the reduction of persistent absence a priority this year. We want to work with you, as parents and carers, to make sure that your child(ren) gains the maximum benefit from their time at All Saints Academy, so will be looking at ways in which we can further improve attendance.

News from Inclusion

It has been a busy start to the new year. As well as using our standalone Inclusion Unit to support our students with high needs, both academic and social and emotional, we have also introduced interventions which support identified students one period a week. We have intervened with behaviour management by asking the students to identify their behaviour triggers and exploring strategies with them to use in lessons to avoid sanctions. A number of students are being supported with handwriting, especially letter formation and fluency of handwriting. The Prince's Trust is now running in Years 9, 10 and 11. Year 9 and Year 11 are following a Teamwork unit and Year 10 are just starting on a unit entitled "Preparing for a healthy lifestyle". We have two students following a course at Develop, concentrating on life skills to prepare them for life Post-16.

By the time we write the next newsletter, I will be able to report on further interventions both in the Academy and in the local community

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Key Stage 3 Rewards Trip

By setting these targets, we are clearly setting out our expectations of behaviour and attendance for all our students. Ashleigh said that she felt "that this school was the pick of the bunch" and Hayden added that "moving to Year 7 was a major life step" he felt that he had settled well in his year group and his "form group were like his family." It's lovely to see our students settled so quickly. Ashleigh has also represented the Academy by attending the Diocesan Synod Conference and reading the lesson at the opening service. Although this was a really nerve-wracking experience, Ashleigh managed this with confidence and impressed the audience who included over 100 members of the clergy from across the Diocese and three Bishops! We have also elected Samuel Odetola as Head Boy Year 8 and Medow Cox as Head Girl Year 8 and we will feature their activities in the next newsletter. KEY STAGE 3

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Building Resilience Project

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We are very pleased to be working with 4YP, one of our Careers' Education providers on the Building Resilience project which aims to work with students to build their self-confidence and ability to deal with challenging students. The team are working with a group of Year 8 boys in the lead up to Christmas and will then be working with a mixed group of Year 7 and 8 girls after Christmas.

The project has started well with students challenging themselves to try new things and to work together as a team to achieve their goals.

Key Stage Attendance is currently 95.4% - we're aiming to get to 96% by Christmas.

Assessment Point 1

Years 7 and 8 have just completed assessments in all of their lessons and it has been really interesting to see the work they have produced. We are starting to introduce GCSE style questions into their assessments as Year 8 are already starting to think about their GCSE courses for next year and Year 7 will find this focus really helpful when their turn comes.

Big Pedal

Each year, the Big Pedal records the numbers of students who travel to school by bike or scooter. All Saints Academy have always done very well in this competition, and this year we came third in the region for numbers participating. We were presented with our award in the Key Stage 3 Assembly on Thursday 4th October and it was great to hear from members of the Sustrans team, who updated us on some of the aspects of cycling safety which we all need to be aware of. As we celebrate our success, we would just like to remind everyone of some cycling safety basics:-

- Cycles and scooters may not be ridden on the Academy site – students must walk their bikes/ scooters to the bike racks
- Everyone who brings a scooter or cycle to the Academy also needs to bring a lock – we have a small supply to lend in an emergency but valuable machines need to be kept safe
- Cycle helmets and reflective clothing are strongly recommended – particularly as the mornings and evenings get darker
- Cycling in the community must be safe members of our local community will always report unsafe travel to us

Project 5 in 5


Project 5 in 5 is a programme delivered to Year 11 students to improve their English and/or maths grade to a Grade 5 and we have the maths results for our first group of students; English is to follow. The report stated:

In the 'Project five' workshop intervention run at All Saints Academy, 15 students completed both the initial and summative assessment. 100% of students improved upon their score in

summative testing (all 15). Headline figures were as follows:

- 100% of students moved up a grade (86% moving to grade 4 and above);
- average raw score of the cohort increased by 17%;
- mean grade change was a 1.4 grade improvement.

The graph to the right shows the improvement made by the 15 students.



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KEY STAGE 5

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University

Going to university is a popular choice for Sixth Form students after they have finished their A levels and BTECs, and All Saints Academy is no different. We are currently supporting students with their UCAS applications and have students applying to a whole range of courses from Medicine to Journalism to Criminology. We are extremely pleased with mature way that our students are approaching their option choices and look forward to receiving all their offers.

Sixth Form Open Evening

The Sixth Form Open Evening will be running on Tuesday 27th November. This is an excellent opportunity for Year 11 students from the Academy and the wider community to come to the school and speak to teachers about what courses are on offer and if they would be suited to the course. Driving

Whilst at Sixth Form, students will turn 17. A number of students will decide that they want to drive so will start taking lessons. We want our Sixth Form students to be responsible behind the wheel so we have set up an elective programme for students where they can study for their driving theory test. Students will learn about the rules of the Highway Code and will practice hazard perception to help them pass their test and become safe drivers.

Rewards

A new Sixth Form Rewards Committee is starting up shortly to look at how Sixth Form students can be praised and rewarded for their hard work. We would like students to be involved so that they have ownership of the system and look forward to taking them out on lots of exciting rewards.

A free breakfast is available for all students at the Academy as we know that a good start to the day helps make a good day.

Student Lunch

Students are able to either bring a packed lunch from home or buy food from the Café to a maximum of £4 per day and we ask that parents/carers ensure that students have enough food or money to see them through the day. We have previously loaned students a maximum of £2.40 for lunch if they have forgotten their food or money but from Monday 5th November we will no longer be doing this as, unfortunately, some students do not always repay their loan; we will instead be providing a small snack and drink if we feel there is a need. Some students choose to spend their daily allowance at break time and we ask parents/ carers to encourage their children to be mindful of the items they are buying and budget their money if they want to eat at both break and lunch time.

ParentPay is an ideal way for you to check on account balances and if you would like login details to access this system, please contact the Academy. ParentPay allows you to top up your child's account online as well as pay for school trips.

Winner-Millie Woods, Runners up-Anica Abdul, Faiza Islam, Maddie Cole.


