Dear Parents and Carers

A big thankyou to those of you who completed the Ofsted survey this month. Nearly 200 of you replied with some very positive comments about the experiences of your child at All Saints Academy.

Some highlights at All Saints Academy are shown below:

84% of parents feel their child is happy 83% of parents feel their child is safe 76% of parents feel their child is well taught 79% of parents feel their child is given appropriate homework for their age 83% of parents would recommend this school to another parent

68% of parents feel they are well-informed of their child's progress

Obviously I am delighted with these results. We still have to improve on some areas and as you can see in the last bullet point above, I want to work with you to ensure we give you the information that you feel you need about your child's progress. I will be sending out a survey soon to ensure we keep moving forward in developing our communications with home.

Many of you took the time to add detail and write about your concerns, and the Heads of Year will be addressing those with you over the coming weeks.

As we move into the final few weeks of term please encourage 100% attendance from your child as this is another area that Ofsted feel we should focus on and we can only improve this with your support!

Dear Parents and Carers

According to the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR), as of the end of 2017, there were 65.6 million people in the world who had been displaced from their own homes. That is equivalent to the entire population of the UK – yes, all of us - being forced to flee and live elsewhere, against our will. There has been a dreadful story in the media about a Syrian refugee boy who was filmed while being abused at his school in Yorkshire, having previously escaped from his war-torn homeland. The irony of that story is the perpetrator has not only been arrested, but his entire family have had to flee their own home because of the threat of reprisals. Whilst two wrongs never make a right, they might be experiencing just a little of what the Syrian family has gone through, although they are exiled only within their own community, not a country thousands of miles away.

As we mark the season of Advent and the birth of Christ, we remember that he and his family were forced to flee their own country, escaping the tyranny of King Herod, and seek exile in Egypt because they would have been killed had they remained in Galilee. I recently heard someone use the phrase 'Man's Inhumanity to Man', (first used by Robert Burns in 1784) when referring to the slaughter of soldiers during the First World War and thinking that very little seems to have changed in the last 100 or, indeed, 2000 years.

However, when I walk around the Academy and see the respect and support that the vast majority of our staff and students show for each other, I am heartened about the prospects for the future. What is even more heartening are the comments made by visitors who always speak about the good behaviour and politeness of our students and the sense of calmness that is around the building. Speaking of respect, the way in which the whole school observed the two-minutes' silence at the Remembrance Service was an extremely moving occasion.

Our community understands the phrase 'Living Well Together' and we should celebrate that fact, especially at this time of year.

Year 11 Mock Results Information

Year 11 had an assembly on Friday when they were given their Mock Results and various pieces of information pertaining to these and their upcoming GCSEs. The main points of this are summarised below:

- Students were advised of their Progress 8 League tables and target groups. Progress 8 scores are all about an individual student's progress made against their silver target in their top 8 subjects. A Progress 8 score of 0 means a student is making expected progress in all subjects. These are a fair measure because they show how students are doing in relation to their own target grades.
- On Tuesday morning the new AP2 league and target groups will be available.
- Students can obtain rewards for House points from AP3 onwards. Details are available from Andy O'Rourke.
- There is additional English and Maths support on offer for ALL students. This includes intensive programmes, Masterclasses and working with a lead English examiner. Again, details are available from Andy O'Rourke.
- We are putting on some additional English and Maths groups to try and help all students maximise their potential. These are available at various times in the week details from Andy O'Rourke.
- We have interventions planned in Period 6, during evening workshops and through independent learning resources.
- New personalised timetables have been created and will be with students / families before the Christmas break.
- Unifrog, the complete destinations platform, is available to students. This is where students can compare, side by side, every Post-16 and Post-18 opportunity in the UK.
- Students can access 1:1 meetings with our 4YP Careers Adviser. These are available every Thursday in the Careers Office.

A Level Film Studies

We have recently had visits from media technician Phil Dickson-Earle, who has previous experience working for the BBC. We had a filming workshop where we learned skills relating to iso and aperture, as well as about depth of field and framing. We took test footage and tried out some of the techniques he taught us so we could put them in our own short films that we were making. We then had a screening of our films. This was very useful as I was able to see whether Phil could understand the narrative of my film and he was also able to give me feedback on my film; what he thought was good about it and what could be improved. He also pointed our slight issues that could be resolved and he always explained what he was saying. For example for my film he said that in-between certain scenes I needed just a fade and not a cross fade, because generally in films using a cross fade means that you are going into a person's mind.

My film was about mental health, more specifically depression and self-harm. I decided to pick these topics because they are more common issues now and they are heard about a lot more. As well as this, I wanted to educate people to make them aware that there are different signs that people can show which could mean that they are depressed. The workshops and technical support have helped me to improve my film and I will look forward to showing my film to an audience.

Students work on this until the beginning of May when their final piece is made in exam conditions over two days. This is the first examination for Year 11, it requires early preparation placed in now as no further revision or work will be required after May.



Chloë Scott, Senior Occupational Therapist, Psychological Therapist.

North Adult Community Mental Health Team

On Wednesday 23rd November, the Year 9 and 12 Health and Social Care Students had a visit from Senior Occupational Therapist and Psychological Therapist, Chloë Scott. We had the chance to listen and talk with Chloë as well as engaging in activities that Occupational Therapist's would take part in. For example, we played Jenga while observing each other's behaviour.

Chloë's work is founded on the concept that occupation is essential to health and wellbeing but it's also about helping the person to do activities they love. Chloë never intended to become an Occupational Therapist, but instead stumbled upon it when she was travelling and met a lady in the profession. She liked the practical aspect of it and how it is interlinked with many other areas. Chloë then applied for her training.

She now works amongst adults in the community who need additional support with their day to day lives, whether through new equipment, or having carers supporting them. Chloë works with lots of other people in different areas of mental and physical health, like Psychologists, Doctors, Paediatricians and Counsellors.

We are very grateful to Chloë Scott for taking the time to come and speak to us. We certainly learnt a lot and were suitably inspired.
