

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Quality of Education – Overview



After re-writing our school curriculum during lockdown we have finally been able to see it in action now that our students have returned to the classroom. Every three week block in the school calendar has a Virtue and Skill assigned to it. These are fundamental to everything we do and are included in all lessons we teach, all assemblies delivered and all experiences offered to our students. The Lower School have predominantly 'Creative Curriculum' lessons taught in three week blocks around a topic theme. The Upper School experience some elements of a Creative Curriculum alongside their traditional lessons. We are evaluating our new curriculum on an on-going basis to ensure the educational experience we offer the students is the best it can be.

Quality of Education – Intent

All students who have creative curriculum lessons are provided with a ready-made lesson booklet where they write all their notes. Students have quickly adapted to the routine of the six part lesson which includes:

Reading practice – a five minute reading link with questions to check understanding **Retrieval** of previous learning or knowledge. This can be recent or from a previous topic

New learning – a small amount of new information to help understanding in the lesson **Assessment for Learning** – a task which allows students to demonstrate understanding **Independent Practice** - an extended piece of work to allow for development

What is Next – this can be a reflection on learning, a plenary or questions which help students look forward to the next stage of learning

For students who require extra support, booklets and topics have been adapted to provide more structure, additional information, extra prompts or simplified materials. The need for these are monitored after every three week topic studied. For students who need additional challenge, every lesson has "challenge questions" built in which stretch student's thinking.

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Quality of Education – Implementation

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
It has been a fantastic start to the year with students accessing learning through our newly developed Creative Curriculum as well as our usual Traditional Curriculum lessons. Response to this has been positive from students and attitude to learning is significantly improved. In addition to the subject-specific learning happening in the classroom, it has been great to hear students discussing how their learning is linking to the virtues and skills embedding everything we are doing. So many of our students have been speaking to me about being 'friendly' whilst learning or discussing the 'leadership' they showed when working as part of a team. The delivery of our new creative lessons has a structure which enables students to see exactly what stage they are at in any lesson. It has been so successful that we are in the process of mirroring our delivery in traditional lessons to that of the creative curriculum. Students can see what is expected of them and are rising to the challenge!



Quality of Education – Impact

Students in Years 7, 8 and 9 have recently completed their first formative assessments for Creative Curriculum Topic 1. This is a piece of classwork that is thoroughly marked by teaching staff. It allows staff to assess the progress of students and provide feedback on their achievements; giving focused next steps





make further progress. Students are in the process of responding to this feedback in their lessons.

Our first full assessment week for all subjects falls in the week beginning 19th October 2020. This will be used to provide

our first progress update to parents in November.

Students in Years 10 and 11 continue to have their work marked and are responding to the feedback in order that they can improve their work.

Canteen Pre Order System

Our new caterers, Harrisons, joined us at the start of term and have embraced our vision for our catering provision, as much as COVID-19 restrictions allow.

To support the social distancing provided by the year group bubbles around the school, we have introduced a pre ordering system for cold food items from the canteen. Students are able to order the items on their iPads and they are then delivered to their social spaces at break and lunchtime. Students who wish to buy the hot food choice are still able to visit the canteen on a year group rotation.

We would like to thank students and families for their support and patience while we introduced this system and ironed out the inevitable teething issues.

Students should only be spending a maximum of £4 per day and they are encouraged to ensure that they do not order more than this when pre ordering food.

If a student has spent more than their daily limit, they will not receive the items they have ordered above this amount or be able to purchase items direct from the canteen, and food items like baguettes will be prioritised over snack items like cookies.

If their account is overdrawn, the canteen may ask that the balance is cleared before serving students. Please be aware that students who are entitled to free school meals will be able to purchase items to a maximum of £2.40 per day irrespective of an overdrawn account.

We ask that you check your child's account regularly and ensure that it is topped up if necessary through ParentPay. If you do not have your ParentPay login, please contact the Academy.
