



Dear Parents and Carers

Thank you, thank you, thank you! Your responses to the Ofsted Parent Survey and text responses were mostly positive and these contributed to a successful Ofsted Section 8 additional inspection on 2nd March; the formal letter will be released after the Easter holidays. In the letter Ofsted will report that Leaders have been taking effective actions to maintain education in the current climate. This, in no small way, was partly down to your very positive comments, for which I am very grateful. We seem to have turned a corner and now have secured the backing of the parent body. As an Academy we need to harness this support and ensure we go from strength to strength.

I will just refer here to the result of the final question, number fourteen, which as a parent I believe is the most important question.





This shows that 76% of you would recommend the Academy to another parent/carer. To recommend a school to another parent/carer, when our children's futures are so precious to us as parents/carers, is a sign of trust. This is a phenomenal result and a huge improvement for us. Although 24% only represents 27 people in the 111 that responded, we cannot afford to rest on our laurels!

I would like to know why these 27 parents/carers would not recommend us to another parent and I invite anyone who answered no to this question to write to me directly at lfurber@asadunstable.org. You can either detail the issues that have caused this negative impression in an email or request a 1:1 meeting with me. We are not afraid of the truth and will do everything we can to address issues.

Our next Ofsted inspection may be a full inspection and to secure an Ofsted rating of GOOD we need to ensure all parents/carers are listened to and feel that we address their concerns. I know as parents and carers you want this to be a GOOD school for the students and our community. When we become a GOOD school it will become easier to recruit staff, leading to improved teaching standards and rising student numbers, which in itself leads to more income and more resources to put in front of your children.

It has been a long term since 4th January, when you will recall that schools opened and then closed again after a day. Over the last three weeks some students have struggled to meet our high expectations but we have been understanding in that uniforms may no longer fit or shoes are too small. However, after Easter we will be back instilling our high expectations of uniform and behaviour so ask that you support us in this.

Thank you once again, sincerely, for your ongoing support in what has been one of the most difficult years I have known as Principal at the Academy and it is with much relief that the outlook is more positive at the moment, with the numbers of COVID cases and deaths dropping.

I do hope that we all can experience a sense of peace and hope as we approach the Easter holidays, and that with God's blessings we will be through this in time for a joyful summer.

Dear Parents and Carers

When Captain Sir Tom Moore passed away a few weeks ago, the media interviewed his daughter. She did not describe him as a knight of the realm, or an exceptional fundraiser, or a national icon, she simply referred to him as a much loved father and grandfather.

Too often, people are defined by what they look like, or by their occupation, or by their status. We ignore the fact that everyone has relationships. The last 12 months have shown how important those relationships are as families have been separated from each other, and tens of thousands of people have mourned the death of a loved one. In that time of utter sadness and despair, the Bible reminds us, 'For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life.'

In amongst the disruption of the pandemic, the UK is conducting its ten-yearly census. The count took place on 21st March (your household will have received the necessary information) and is the first ever digital census. For those of you who have looked at previous census materials (it's only available at the moment up to 1911: 1921 information will be released next year), it lists all the people living in a household on that particular date and, alongside each name, gives a relationship. The Head of the household is identified first, then, for example, children are listed as son or daughter. Sometimes you find grandchildren mentioned or nieces and nephews, depending on circumstances.

The census invariably takes place around Easter time, which is the most significant event of the Christian calendar but, interestingly, such a process is also mentioned around the time of the birth of Jesus. At Easter we remember Jesus' death on the cross and the very final words that he uttered: 'Father, forgive them...'. Jesus didn't use grand titles in his most desperate hour of need, like 'God', 'Almighty', 'King of Kings' (or any other that might denote power or status), he simply used the most personal of words — Father - to describe his relationship. Similarly, at his baptism, God had referred to Jesus as his 'beloved Son'. Again, no reference to grander titles like that which the Romans placed on His cross: 'Jesus of Nazareth, King of the Jews'.

Easter this year is a time of hope in many ways as we start to emerge from darkness into light and we increasingly get the opportunity to re-establish treasured relationships with loved ones and friends. The pandemic has served to remind us how much we rely on each other. So, with the government counting everyone who resides in the country this year, we should also remember that, in God's eyes, you are not just a statistic but a precious individual where even the 'hairs on your head are all counted' as well.





Figures based on 111 responses up to 05-03-2021


In question five, it was wonderful to see 72% of you have recognised that in every newsletter we are giving you an update on our creative curriculum and what your child will be covering in every year group based upon the virtues and skills. The link to the latest version of the Newsletter is here.

A fabulous set of answers to questions 8, 9 and 10, with 69% of parents/carers saying we have high expectations of their children, 72% of parents/carers saying their child does well at this school and 77% saying the school lets them know how their child is doing. Creative Curriculum Topic 8

Year 7— Good Old British Sense of Humour

Topic 8 is about the Good Old British Sense of Humour, focusing heavily on the virtues of good humour and good temper. A focus on making light of difficult situations and learning to enjoy what we have rather than missing what we don't have are vital qualities to develop during difficult times. Good humour and temper build resilience and courage; which in turn increase confidence. Problem solving skills to explore the mathematical calculations of measurement, time and ratios will be undertaken in



STEM, ensuring a good understanding and development of capacity scenarios, energy transfer and friction testing tasks. There is a real focus on Britain in all lessons. In PE students will embrace teamwork to support others and to outwit opponents; showing good temperament when winning or losing. Arts will explore British Artists and traditional British pastimes such as scone making and tea tasting and exploring British composers in music and the tradition of Morris Dancing. In Social Sciences the focus will be British traditions and holidays. Geography will



explore the topic of "staycations", exploring different places to visit in the UK and what they have to offer. History will look at the rich cultural heritage of the British Isles and the history of the leisure and entertainment industry. In RS the focus again will be Britain and the deep-rooted religious culture underpinning our society but resilience and good temperament were particularly

important for Jesus' followers at the time of his resurrection. In English, students will be looking at the persuasive language of travel in Britain, travel poetry and creative texts. MFL will focus on vocabulary and conversation surrounding weather (so often a focus of conversation in Britain) and description of locations in different countries.


Year 8— Keep Calm and Carry On

This topic, based on the well-known phrase 'keep calm and carry on' focuses on perseverance during adversity. At



Easter, Christians remember Jesus 'carrying on' in the face of his arrest, trial and crucifixion. Promoting the virtues of **good temper and good humour,** this topic links to situations where good temper and good humour have an impact on situations and outcomes. The skill of **problem solving**

will be developed, ensuring that students have the tools to solve challenges in life. There is a strong focus on what makes the national British character while at the same time promoting the British Value of **tolerance** and the importance of having a "stiff upper lip"! English lessons will focus on Romeo and Juliet, focusing on the



impact of conflicts around the world and history focusing on the Blitz. RS lessons will focus on the trial and crucifixion of Jesus, and his good temper in accepting his death. Arts subjects will focus on comedy, with art focusing on caricatures in art, and drama focusing on comic timing through the study of the play "Too Much Punch for Judy". MFL lessons will look at the focus of much British humour – the weather.



Year 10 - It is The Small Things...

In Topic 8, Year 10 start 'It is the small things that make a difference' with a focus on the virtue of **good temper and humour** whilst developing their **problem solving** skills. In Arts,



Year 10 will be learning to make canapés as the small part of a party that can make a big difference to the atmosphere. The STEM lessons



bring together science and maths through **problem-solving** as both subjects look at using equations with maths solving them and science balancing them. Year 10 will also need to manage their **temper** as they develop these skills, which many can find difficult. Social Sciences will focus on climate change, war and global conflict and the small things that these issues can

create, but also the small things that can make a difference in stopping them. In Languages, English will look at **humour** in poetry as well as poetry linked to identity and tolerance so students understand the small things that they do that might impact others. MFL will focus on the customs and traditions of France and Spain, countries which both have **humour** and fun at the heart of their festivities.

Creative Curriculum Topic 8

Year 9— Isn't the World a Funny Place?

This topic is the eighth in Year 9 and falls at the end of the spring term and the beginning of the summer term. There is a gap between weeks 1 and 2 for the Easter holidays. Good temper and good humour are virtues that will help you to cope with any experience, either with other people or a situation.

This was especially important for Jesus' followers at the time of his resurrection which we, as Christians, remember at Easter. If students have a good temperament, and know how to react to things appropriately, they will be more likely to form good relationships with others and be able to solve problems if and when they occur. To promote the virtues of good temper and good humour this topic is all about helping students to make sensible decisions and to help



them decide whether their actions could make people angry or make them smile or laugh. It will also help them to develop ways to share the views of others. The skill of problem solving (Levels 7-11) focusses on using logic trees to help students solve complex problems. They will look at how they assess situations, process them and then decide on a course of action - deciding to laugh or cry or just take things in their stride. **STEM** explores forces and energy. What is it about a theme park and the rides that we go on that make some people laugh or some people cry? Maths will teach students probability and the likelihood of events happening; also how to use Venn diagrams to organise information. In Languages they will compare some texts/poems that have the ability to make us laugh but equally some may evoke feelings of anger. In MFL students will explore the terms for feelings and emotions and try to include these in descriptions about feelings in a diary entry, they will also look at humour in another language. In Arts they will explore being



creative and investigate how to draw caricatures of each other. They will discuss whether caricatures are intended to make the subject laugh when the image is finished, or make them angry, because the artist has distorted their features in a way that the subject may not find funny. In Social Sciences students will look at how we are solving the problem of tourism in Antarctica in

geography and in history they will explore some of the strange medical methods used over time. Guest speakers: We are still planning on providing the students with a workshop experience from 'Laughology' who will be working with each tutor group. One of their aims will be to develop problem solving and thinking skills through humour. It may also enable students to think on their feet. RS links the idea of self-control and Karma to being able to make the right decisions when we need to and knowing where to go to get advice if we need it. Do we make the right decisions or try to solve all problems on our own?




It was good to see so many positive results to questions on the Ofsted Parent Survey relating to behaviour and attitudes, and shows that the Academy is moving in the right direction.



Figures based on 111 responses up to 05-03-2021




2. My child feels safe at this school.


73% of you say the school makes sure its pupils are well behaved. Although good, I would like to see this figure above 80%, so let us know what we can do to improve.





Students' Return—Upper School

As we welcome students back to face to face learning for their GCSEs in upper school, as an Academy we are proud of how students have maintained focus, determination and resilience within their learning. Students have returned to school understanding the importance of their GCSE studies and are motivated to getting back to the normality of being in the classroom again.

In Year 10, students have resumed their timetabled lessons with enthusiasm. Whilst students have been away, teachers have been planning a range of enrichment activities in and out of lessons. Year 10 have already had workshops from professionals over Zoom, practical cooking lessons, practical PE lessons and much more.

Wednesday saw the distribution of COVID home testing kits and Year 10 handled this incredibly maturely, allowing staff to hand every student their tests and instructions and sign for their tests in a single afternoon registration. Year 10 have taken this task in their stride and have ensured that they are self-testing and notifying the school of their results promptly to help keep each other safe.

For Year 11, a bespoke timetable has been created to enable them to generate their best work to support teachers with their Centre Assessed Grades. Canteen

The canteen has asked us to remind parents/carers that there is a £4 per day spend limit on all students' accounts. Please can parents/carers ask children to be mindful of what they are spending and that if they have bought items at break, the canteen will not be able to serve them at lunchtime if they do not have enough money left from their daily limit.

Bikes and Scooters

Please can parents/carers remind students, that all bikes and scooters brought onto the Academy site should be stored in the bike sheds and secured with a lock for safety. While we take every precaution to restrict access to the site, bikes and scooters are left at the owners' risk, but this risk is greatly reduced by the use of a lock.

COVID Home Testing

The government has told us that twice weekly testing should continue through the Easter holiday and all students have been given two more boxes of tests so that you have enough at home. Please remember to report results to NHS Test and Trace as well as letting the Academy know through Edulink.

Lockers

We have introduced a 'no bag' policy in the canteen and to give students somewhere to store their personal items, all students will be issued with a locker. Years 7, 9 and 11 have already been issued with a locker and students in Years 8 and 10 will be issued with lockers after the Easter holiday. Keys have been issued free of charge but we do ask that if your child loses their key, a replacement is bought at a cost of £2.80. For students who have paid the £5 deposit that was part of our previous locker scheme, we will be arranging refunds shortly for all students who returned keys during the recent recall.

Chaplain's Message

Well done for getting through to Easter! Hopefully things continue to improve and a sense of normality is on the horizon. One part of the Easter story that really challenges and comforts me is a conversation Jesus had on the cross with a criminal. At the end of the conversation Jesus replied, "I assure you, today you will be with me in

paradise." (Luke 23:43) I wonder what we think of when we think of "paradise"? Perhaps some sun-kissed, remote island, spending time lying on the beach with an ice cold drink to hand? Perhaps the chance to go back to meeting up with friends and family, going out together for a meal and/or a sporting/music event? Certainly, over the last 12 months there have been plenty of things that we might have taken for granted before, and now, with the opportunities



to re-do some of those things looking hopeful on the horizon; our definition of "paradise" might have changed. We might have become more grateful for the smaller things in life - certainly put some perspective on the things that we value. That said I think these words of Jesus tell us that the thief on the cross would be with him in



paradise and is supposed to be somewhere special although it's also fair to say that no-one can be completely sure what Jesus meant. By all accounts, that thief had spent his life here on earth as a liar, cheater and thief. Probably not a very nice person and hardly living a stress free life, enjoying life to the full. Here, Jesus is offering that thief a place which would be beyond the thief's wildest dreams. Did he deserve it? Clearly not! But Jesus offers it to him anyway! The

wonderful story of Easter is that we, as humans, mess up. We get things wrong - and often we're too stubborn to even admit it! We hardly deserve a place in paradise even though we may well have done some really good things; raised our children, volunteered for community events, fundraised for charities etc. but, in themselves, those things don't qualify for the paradise Jesus was offering. However, that offer is available to everyone - irrespective of whether or not we think we deserve it or not. Jesus invites everyone to that special place beyond our wildest dreams. Maybe during this Eastertide, it might be something worth further exploration.
