Pathways: Post 16

Use this leaflet to:

- Find out what providers are available
- Find out what courses are available
- Find out what you need to think about when making your decision and who can help.

During Year 11 you will need to make a decision about your next steps into education, employment or training. The main options available to you include:

- Sixth Form School/ Sixth Form College Most Sixth Forms offer A-levels, with some offering you the option to take BTEC's, or A-levels combined with BTEC's.
- Further Education College At college, you are more likely to have to choose between a vocational course (practical skills and technical knowledge needed for a particular career), like a BTEC or A-levels.
- Apprenticeships After Year 11 there are two types of Apprenticeship that are available to you, Level 2: Intermediate (equivalent of 5 GCSEs) and Level 3: Advanced (equivalent of 2 A-levels). The Higher and Degree Level Apprenticeships are only eligible to you if you have a Level 3 qualification already.
- Training Provision Local training provision is offered mainly by Independent Providers and is available at all Levels – from Entry Level to Level 3. Options include Study Programmes and Traineeships. Some providers also lead on the delivery of apprenticeships.

Key points that you may want to consider:

- What subjects do I need to get the job I want in the future?
- Am I going on to university and if so, what subjects do I need to access the course that I want to do?
- What subjects am I good at and what do I enjoy?
- What is my learning style? Is an academic route (A-levels) or a more vocational/technical route (BTECs, Cambridge Technical) right for me?
- Do I have the grades I need? Do I have a contingency plan if I don't meet my entry requirements?

Key things that you may want to do:

- Have a discussion with your careers advisor.
- Have a discussion with your parent/carer –what do they think?
- Attend some College/Sixth Form Open Days.
- Attend local careers events.
- Investigate apprenticeships available in the area.

Raising Participation Age: The government has increased the age to which all young people must continue in education and training to 18. This doesn't mean that you have to stay in school and it doesn't mean that you can't get a job. It does mean that you must continue in some form of learning until at least your 18th birthday. You can stay in education, go on an Apprenticeship, or get a job but there must be some training with the job. In real day-to-day terms this doesn't really restrict your choices at all.
