Dear Parents and Carers

The pandemic will probably teach us a number of lessons that the country will reflect on should such a thing ever occur again. One is about the importance of vaccines to combat the worst effects of such a disease, and the second is about the importance and value of outdoor spaces and fresh air. Having the vaccine is a matter of personal choice and individuals must make up their own minds about it. I, for one, have been very happy to have my three Covid and one flu vaccinations. I know that there were many parents and carers who were keen for their children to be inoculated when it was offered in school during this last month. I believe there will be the offer of a second vaccination after about three months; we await the details of that. I was pleased that we were not subjected, as were several schools nationally, to the ant-vax campaigners and their threats of legal action. It is very important that everyone makes up their own minds about what is best for themselves and their families, although I do worry about the influence that social media is having on this issue. For my own part, I would rather trust the combined wisdom of doctors and scientists than someone without expertise posting on Tik-Tok! On the matter of spaces, the creation of bubbles last year made us look at how appropriate our outdoor, and indeed indoor, areas are for our students. Whilst our playing fields are a tremendous asset, they cannot be accessible all year round. We saw that some of our hard-standing areas had been originally designed more for their aesthetic appeal rather than for their practicality. Much of the exterior of the Academy has been transformed over the past 12 months so that year groups have areas that are suitable all year round. We were very grateful to the Local and Public Health Authorities for providing funding that meant new benches and protective sails were installed in the areas that we had redeveloped into more useable spaces. In addition, the Academy has installed outdoor gym equipment and totally developed the Reflection Centre garden, partly as a memorial to the Houghton brothers but also as a safe and quiet place for students to be. Our biggest project, which will hopefully be fully operational after Christmas, is the extension to the Canteen area. This will provide far more space for students to enjoy their lunches and includes additional toilet facilities. Some other exciting projects, like the development of the bungalow, will also bring great benefits to both the curriculum and student wellbeing. Much has been talked about the mental health of young people, and we have excellent structures and programmes in place to support this, but physical health is also important and the creation of these new spaces makes that increasingly possible to support. At All Saints we believe very much in nurturing and developing the whole person. The funding we receive is intended for those students who are currently with us, not those who might arrive in future years. That is why we have invested significant amounts during the past 18 months when the need has been there.

December Virtue: Generosity

Skill: Creativity

Year 7

In Arts, Year 7 students will be exploring the virtue of **generosity** and the skill of **creativity** through the creation and giving of greeting card birds. In dance, students will continue their ZooNation unit, focusing on showing **creativity** as they choreograph scenes. In DT, students will be working on wood and plastic materials. In food, students will be developing knife skills. In media, students will be focusing on television and films as media outlets, exploring how media



channels demonstrate **creativity** through sharing or stretching the truth. In music, students will be continuing their studies of Caribbean music, giving **generous** feedback to others' performances. In PE, students will study football, basketball and netball, focusing on their **creativity** in embedding skills into their sports.

In Languages, English lessons will continue to focus on the book 'Skyhawk'. Students will explore how the

characters are **generous** to one another and when **generosity** is not reciprocated. Students will look **creatively** at how they would respond in the situations faced by the characters. In Spanish, students are continuing to look at free time activities, focusing on how people can be **generous** with their free time. They will also be **creative** in choosing how they want to spend their own free time. In French, students will focus on relationships and school, focusing on **generosity** about someone's positive traits and empathetic towards a person's shortcomings. They will

demonstrate **creativity** by making French New Year cards, before demonstrating **generosity** by giving these to loved ones.

In Social Sciences, Year 7 students will continue to focus on the British Isles in geography, demonstrating generosity about the positive features of Britain. They will demonstrate creativity as they plan a potential

'staycation'. In history, students will continue to focus on the Anglo-Saxons, considering the **generosity** demonstrated by King William after his conquest. In philosophy and ethics, students will study the key beliefs of different religions, demonstrating **generosity** where these views differ to their own.



In STEM, students will continue to study algebra, demonstrating creativity as they write their own expressions



based on information provided. They will demonstrate **generosity** with their time, supporting students to complete these tasks. Students will study particle models in science, demonstrating **creativity** as they design their own models to represent diffusion of particles. In computer science, students will complete their Kodu unit, demonstrating **creativity** as they create a 3D video game, demonstrating **generosity** as they provide feedback to peers.

December Virtue: Generosity

Skill: Creativity

Year 8

In Arts, Year 8 students will continue developing their Diwali Embroidery, demonstrating **creativity** with their patterns and **generosity** in gifting these. Dance lessons will continue to explore the Andy Goldsworthy stimulus, demonstrating **creativity** as they develop their choreographies. Drama lessons will explore mystery plans and protest, with students able to demonstrate **creativity** as they rehearse specific scenes. They will demonstrate **generosity** as they provide feedback. DT lessons will focus on the sketching and presenting of ideas. Students will focus on the **creativity** used in false advertising. Food lessons will focus on protein, demonstrating **creativity** as they make their own chicken fajitas. Media lessons will focus on the history of the cinema, looking at **creativity** in advertising and the **generosity** demonstrated to entice customers. Music lessons will explore samba, with students demonstrating **creativity** as they develop their composition. In PE lessons, students will analyse the performances of team members, demonstrating **generosity** as they review their own performance and that of others.

In Languages, students will develop a creative writing piece in English. They will read their own story to their

peers, who will demonstrate **generosity** by listening well and providing polite and **generous** feedback. In French, students will explore the weather and the clothes suitable for different weather. They will focus on **generosity** by considering animal welfare in relation to fashion and **creativity** as they create and present a short presentation. In Spanish, students will continue to look at free time activities, considering how they can be **generous** with their time. They will be

creative as they describe the different activities they do in their free time.

In Social Sciences, students will continue to study population change in geography, considering the **generosity** of those who care for aging populations. Students will also explore **creative** ways in tackling aging populations by encouraging younger families to move to an area. In history, students will explore the **generosity** antislavers had in trying to fight for emancipation. They will also consider the **creativity** of anti-slavers in convincing others to abolish slavery. In philosophy and ethics, students will focus on inspirational leaders, providing **generous** accounts of the impact they had.

In STEM, students will continue to study data in maths, considering how data can be misused **creatively** and considering the **generosity** demonstrated by some measures. In science, students will study the structure of the earth, demonstrating creativity as they build a rock cycle model. In computer science, students will

demonstrate **creativity** as they continue to create programs in the Python programming language.

December Virtue: Generosity Skill: Creativity

Year 9

In Arts, students will be continuing their studies of surrealism in art. They will create designs which are

recognisable but not realistic. In dance, students will continue their studies of Musical Theatre, with students able to develop their **creativity** in their choreography. In drama, students will continue to study Stanislavksi and Brecht, developing their **creativity** as they rehearse scenes. In DT, students will explore structures and architecture. Students will be



able to create a design, ensuring these are accurate. In food, students will make scones and bread. In media, students will explore campaigns and sponsorship, exploring the **creativity** used in false advertising. In music, students will create a protest song. In PE, students will demonstrate **creativity** in developing strategies to win their game.

In Languages, students will be developing a creative writing piece, developing highly descriptive and



imaginative pieces of writing. In French, students will explore **generosity** by being inclusive in inviting people to a festival. In Spanish, students will explore where they would like to work, exploring the **generosity** that can be demonstrated in the workplace. They will demonstrate **creativity** as they create an extended writing piece across three tenses.

In Social Sciences, students will continue to study glaciers in geography. Students will explore the creative solutions and **generosity** demonstrated by countries working together to tackle climate change. In history, students will focus on political reform, exploring the **creativity**



used to promote political change and the **generosity** demonstrated by politicians in times of political change. In philosophy and ethics, students will explore the sanctity of life, exploring giving life and respecting life as an act of **generosity**.

In STEM, students will explore **creativity** and **generosity** as they enlarge shapes to create more space in maths.



In science, students will explore evolution, exploring **generosity** in preserving biodiversity. Students will also be **creative** in predicting future evolutions of species. In computer science, students will demonstrate **creativity** as they continue to create programs in the Python programming language.

Year 11

Maths


Project 5 in 5 is a programme delivered to Year 11 students to improve their English and/or maths grade to a grade 5 and we have the results of our first groups of students. In the five day maths intervention run at All Saints Academy, ten students completed both the initial and summative assessment. 90% of these students improved on their raw score in summative testing. Headline figures were as follows:

80% of students moved up a grade (60% moving to grade 4 and above)

Average raw score of the cohort increased by 10.6%

Mean grade change was a 1.4 grade improvement

The graph below shows the improvement made by the students.



Mock Exams

11 Year students completed their first set of mock exams on Friday 26th November. The majority have shown resilience and great courage in the face of this challenge and I am certain their results will reflect this brilliant effort. Teachers will be able to give detailed feedback from these exams to parents/carers on Year 11 Parents' Evening Tuesday 14th December 2021.

English


In the five day English intervention run at All Saints Academy, ten students completed both the initial and summative assessment. 100% of these students improved upon their raw score in summative testing. Headline figures were as follows:

Three students improved by two grades

Average grade increase 1.2

Average raw score of the cohort was increased by 11.75%


Student Parliament Update

Advent Blessing

As we come crashing into December and the run up to Christmas, we enter what Christians call, Advent.



Advent Sunday (November 28th this year) is actually the start of the churches calendar and it's a start which prepares us for Christmas. When we think of preparation for Christmas we often think it means things like; shopping for presents, decorating a tree, sending cards, partying with friends and/or work colleagues, getting the house cleaned and sorted for special guests etc. But for Christians, there is a lot more to it than that.

Advent is also about God entering our world as one of us in the form of baby Jesus. As such Advent is about

expectant waiting, hopeful anticipation and joyful expectation. It's about waiting for God to come into our hearts and minds at all times and in all circumstances; the good times and the difficult moments, and for us to realise that God understands what it is like to live the human life. Furthermore, Advent reminds us all that God's promise to us is that Jesus will return again and that we should try to get our own lives in order too but that there is also joy in these things. We've missed the point if



we think the weeks leading up to Christmas are just about waiting in the queue to buy our Christmas presents or frittering our time away at parties (although that's not to say these things can't be done or enjoyed).

As a season, Advent is often regarded as similar to Lent. Certainly both are times of reflection and waiting. But they are also very different. Whilst Lent is more about repentance and saying sorry, a time to give our lives a bit of a spring clean if you like, Advent is more a season of hope and anticipation. A time to prepare to welcome that special guest I mentioned in my first paragraph - Jesus.

The colours of Advent are often thought of as green and red. Green for the tree and a colour for growth and nature and red for the colour of blood as well as celebration. However, it would be more accurate to think of them as purple and pink, like on a traditional advent wreath. Purple, because it is a colour of remembering as well as prayer, penitence and sacrifice. And pink because it is the colour of rejoicing. The third candle in the advent wreath is the pink candle lit for Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete means rejoice! It gives us a break from all the other preparations to remind us of the joyful hope we have for the future, and to not lose heart because it isn't long now till the countdown has ended...

So Advent isn't just about shopping, stressing, planning, and buying. It is about expecting, waiting, hoping, and



praying. There's a phrase that is sometimes recalled that if you are sick of Christmas by December 25th then you haven't done Advent correctly! So, as part of your Advent this year why not do something a little different? Volunteer at a charity shop, hospital or soup kitchen, spend some extra time in prayer, spend more quality time with your family, call that person who's been on your mind recently, speak kindly to strangers, maybe even go to church. But perhaps

most of all, share some hope with those who need it most whilst we wait for the special guest, Jesus Christ.
