All Saints Academy is located on Houghton Road in Dunstable (Eastern region of England). The school postcode falls within the Houghton Hall ward/electoral division, which is in the constituency of South West Bedfordshire. Houghton Regis is within walking distance with Luton, Leighton Buzzard and neighbouring villages accessible by car and/or bus.

Both main roads near the Academy – Houghton Road, where there are waiting restrictions Monday to Friday from 8am to 4.30pm, and the A5 (High Street North) – have a 30mph speed limit. Some of the adjoining side roads operate a reduced 20mph speed limit.

There is one vehicular access point to the school site from Houghton Road and car access limited during the school day with access controlled by reception staff.



The Academy has a single designated pedestrian gate. A pelican crossing is located on Houghton Road outside the entrance gate as well as on the A5 (High Street North).

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Access to Reception is via a path from the gate and a zebra crossing ensures the safety of pedestrians as they cross the spur road off of the main driveway that leads to the car park. There is an additional zebra crossing on this spur road for students to use when walking from the nearby bike sheds to the Academy building.





Disabled accessibility features on the Academy site include:

- Drop kerbs
- Wide paths
- Level access at all doorways
- Auto opening doors at main reception
- Disabled parking spaces

The canteen has been extended and this was completed December 2021.

Bicycles

There are cycle lanes along Houghton Road and some areas of Houghton Regis have shared pedestrian/cycle paths that are built away from the roads that service the community.



Public Transport

The Academy is located on a bus route with links to Dunstable, Houghton Regis, Leighton Buzzard, Bedford, Milton Keynes and Biggleswade. Some of the bus routes link to others that use the Luton-Dunstable Busway, a guided busway that provides quick, direct connection between Houghton Regis, Dunstable and Luton.

There is a bus stop located outside the Academy gates serving Dunstable, Luton, Leighton Buzzard, Bedford and Biggleswade. Bus stops providing additional routes, including Milton Keynes, can be found a short walk from the Academy on the A5 (High Street North).

Cars

The site is served by the A5 (High Street North) to the west and via Houghton Road from the east; the M1 is also easily accessed with junctions 9, 11, 11a and 12 providing the most convenient access.

Deliveries

The majority of deliveries to the Academy arrive in small or medium vans. The only exceptions are deliveries to the canteen which are delivered in a lorry and the collection of our refuse skips. Canteen deliveries, on the whole, take place before the school day.

Deliveries of bulk items are pre planned and companies liaise with the Facilities Manager to reduce risk to safety of students, staff and visitors.

Nearby Facilities and Schools

Dunstable town centre with a shopping area containing high street stores, a large Asda store, a Lidl store and an Aldi store is a short 15 to 20 minutes' walk away. There is also a central library, leisure centre and bowling alley.

There is a Morrisons store located a 15 to 20 minutes' walk towards Houghton Regis.

While there are no official Park and Stride car parks locally, parents/carers are asked to consider dropping off students further from the Academy, with suggestions such as making use of local/supermarket car parks on days when they will be shopping/visiting facilities covered by these car parks and are legitimately able to park there.




The data shows that while the percentage of students walking has decreased and the number of those travelling by car has increased, there has been an increase in those cycling and travelling by public bus.

Compare the data above to that collected in previous years. Has there been an increase or reduction in a particular mode of travel? Is there a known reason for this?

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While these maps do not indicate significantly more home post codes being nearer the Academy in 2023 compared to 2022, we could conject that the effects of the coronavirus pandemic may have influenced the mode of travel, with parents continuing to bring their children to school in family vehicles. Factors from previous years could still apply, such as an increase in the number of siblings attending the Academy which could show an increase in the number of students travelling by car but would not necessarily mean an increase the number of car journeys being made. Other factors that cannot be measured, but could have influenced the trend, include changes in friendship groups and the effect of this on peer attitudes to walking; weather during the period before the data collection could impact the choices made by students.



The <u>Luton and Central Bedfordshire Liftshare Scheme</u> has been shared with staff through the weekly staff bulletin and on the staffroom noticeboard.

Review of current travel arrangements

In relation to travel at the start and end of the school day what currently works well?

For example, a high proportion of pupils walk, scoot or cycle, good parking etiquette by those collecting pupils, good compliance with waiting restrictions, School Crossing Patrol or a controlled crossing that is well used etc.

Of the students surveyed, 74% either walk to school or use cycles/scooters. For the safety of other students, cycles/scooters are not allowed to be ridden on the Academy site and must be walked from the gate to the cycle sheds. There are staff on duty both at the beginning and end of the school day to ensure students follow these expectations.

The pelican crossing outside the Academy gates is well used by students.

On the whole, parents/carers are aware of safety around the Academy gates and do not obstruct the entrance.
