Ingredients

- 225g plain flour, plus for extra dusting
- 2tsp bicarbonate of soda
- Ground ginger
- Cinnamon
- 75g of unsalted butter
- 100g soft brown sugar
- 100g golden syrup

Method

- 1. Heat oven to 190C/170C fan/gas mark 5 and line a baking tray with baking parchment.
- Sieve the flour, salt, bicarb, ginger and cinnamon into a large bowl.
- 3. Heat the butter, sugar and syrup until dissolved.
- 4. Leave the sugar mixture to cool slightly then mix into the dry ingredients to form a dough.
- 5. Chill the dough in the fridge for 30 minutes.
- On a surface lightly dusted with flour, roll 6. out the dough to a 1/4- inch thickness.
- 7. Stamp out the gingerbread men shapes with a cutter, then re-roll any off cuts and repeat.
- 8. Place your gingerbread shapes on the lined trays allowing space for them to spread.
- 9. Cook for 10-15 minutes then remove from the oven to cool.

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From the Chaplain

Focus verse:

"Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: Rejoice!" Acts 7:59

During Christmas time we can often think of traditions and values that we hold dear, or there might be



friends or family members, no longer with us who have a particular significance in our lives which means it can be quite difficult for some people amongst the joyous celebrations and festivities. So I thought we would look briefly at some things that often go under the radar in the latter part of Advent and into the Christmas Season.

The first thing is the 3rd Sunday in Advent which is traditionally called Gaudete Sunday. During the season of preparation in Advent there is one Sunday to remind us specifically that these preparations are for a

joyful time, that it is a celebration even though there might be hard work leading up to Christmas. Therefore, the 3rd Sunday has a slightly different focus and has a different coloured candle, pink instead of purple, on the advent wreath. Gaudete is Latin for rejoice! And given most liturgy in churches originates from Latin, it has kept its name. Being on the 3rd Sunday it



is a reminder that the time for celebrations is very nearly upon us as we rejoice at the gift of God's Son, Jesus, come to earth in human form to show us what God is like and to remind us that He is relational, loves us unconditionally, and is very much for us!

Also, there are two Saints that Christians think of around Christmas time. One is Stephen. He is widely regarded as the first martyr in Christianity because he stood up for what he believed in. It was a truth that was actually good for people to hear, it was not an extreme point of view but people did not want to know and so they stoned him. He is remembered in the Christian Calendar on 26th December (Boxing Day). He is

the St Stephen that is sung about in the carol Good King Wenceslas.

The other Saint is the fourth century Bishop, St Nicholas, or probably better known as Father Christmas or Santa Claus. St Nicholas is the Patron Saint of Children amongst other things. Legend has it that he secretly gave gifts to children and the rest has evolved from that — there is plenty that we can read up about him.

So, may I take this opportunity to wish you a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year, remembering that it is a joyous time that we celebrate with special traditions but that it can also be a time remembering loved ones no longer with us.
